Since March 2016, the European Committee of the Regions has been active in the "Reflecting on Europe/Future of Europe" campaign, providing a platform for regions, cities and their citizens to engage in the debate on the future of Europe. In December 2018, a new concept of permanent structured dialogue mechanism was proposed for discussion by the presidents of the CoR and the European Economic and Social Committee (EESC). The call for a reinforced link between the EU and its citizens was reaffirmed by the Declaration of the 8th European Summit of Regions and Cities in March this year. The CoR is thus in the process of designing its "European Citizens' Consultations" model; a more permanent and structured format, combined with a feedback mechanism aiming to better include the local level in the EU decision-making process. To prepare for this new model, a **series of lunchtime seminars** are held in the CoR with local experts, aiming at collecting insights on citizen engagement from the local/regional point of view.

## Participatory Budget in Paris: citizens decide and the City implements



**Ari Brodach** began his career in 2002, in a consultancy firm specialising in sustainable development policies. He became director for sustainable development for the City of Lille in 2006, where he designed and implemented a number of processes and tools for involving the public in

decision-making. In 2011 he was appointed as director of sustainable development for the training centre for local civil servants (CNFPT), and has supervised the introduction of sustainable development into nationwide training programmes. Mr. Brodach has headed the team coordinating the Participatory Budget in Paris since 2015. It is one of the largest participatory budgets in the world, with EUR 100 million allocated to citizens' projects every year. 220 000 people were involved in the budget in 2018.

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## Deliberative democracy: G1000, W100 and other Belgian examples



**Cato Léonard** is co-founder of Glassroots, a consulting company that helps governments, companies, cities and organisations to implement change successfully through the participation of external stakeholders and citizens. She is also co-founder and campaign

leader of G1000, a citizens movement for participatory democracy.

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## Participatory Budgeting. The experience of Madrid



**Borja Prieto Ursúa** is Head of Institutional Extension at Madrid City Council, where he manages cooperation with other public administrations on citizen participation. He is also responsible for relationships with supra-national entities such as the United Nations Development Program, the

World Bank and the Iberoamerican Capital Cities Union with regard to citizen participation projects. Mr Ursúa is a career civil servant and has previously held management positions in both public administrations and private companies. He was associate professor at the ICAI School of Engineering in Madrid.

## Smart talking – lessons from our citizens panels



**Nicola Vathauer** is communications director for EUROCITIES, the network of major European cities. Ms Vathauer has over 20 years of experience in pan-European communications strategy and delivery, and is an expert in

Europe-wide campaigns, events and cross-sector engagement.

Her job is to ensure that the wide variety of sectors covered by EUROCITIES' work is communicated coherently to European institutions, stakeholders and media. She has recently been working on the EUROCITIES democracy campaign "cities4Europe – Europe for citizens" and the citizens' panels pilot project on the future of Europe. She has a PhD in political science and over 25 years of work experience in representing local and regional governments' interests at European level (for different organisations and different levels of government).
